Tour of Portsmouth Naval Hospital Building One

On October 19, 2022, Mr. Allen Cutchin, the Volunteer Command Historian of the Naval Medical Center Portsmouth, gave a wonderful and informative tour of the hospital's Building One to nine NCHSC volunteers.

Originally known as Portsmouth Naval Hospital, it is the first and oldest Naval Hospital in the United States. Construction on the hospital began in 1827 on the site of Fort Nelson. In fact, over a half-million bricks used in the construction of the hospital came from the Fort Nelson buildings. Portsmouth

> Naval Hospital opened for medical service in 1830 with its first medical director, Surgeon Thomas Williamson. Today, the medical center includes three buildings -- Building One, the High Rise (opened in 1960), and the Charette Center (opened in 1999). The medical center employs a staff of about 6,500 military personnel, civilians, and contractors.

Our volunteers toured from the "dungeon to the dome". Mr. Cutchin was knowledgeable about the history and even threw in a few ghost stories.

Remembering Mrs. Eleanor Phillips Cross

We were saddened to learn of the passing of NCHSC Charter Member and Director Emeritus, Mrs. Eleanor Phillips Cross, on September 23, 2022. As a life-long resident of Hampton Roads, Eleanor cultivated a love for local history and shared her interest with husband, Charles B. Cross, Jr.

While raising their family, the Crosses became integral to the merger of Norfolk County and South Norfolk that created the City of Chesapeake - Charles as a principal architect in the merger and the first Clerk of

the Circuit Court of Chesapeake, and Eleanor as a local news reporter for the Chesapeake Post.

Eleanor later created scrapbooks full of newspaper articles and memorabilia pertaining to the merger and donated them to the NCHSC.

year, Eleanor and Charles, In October of that same along with a handful of dedicated Chesapeake citizens, founded the Norfolk County Historical Society of Chesapeake, VA. Both Eleanor and Charles served on the board of directors and held several offices. They continued their historical and genealogical research and donated much of it to the NCHSC Wallace Room Collection.

The Crosses co-wrote a number of noteworthy NCHSC publications, including Chesapeake: A Pictorial History, The War Comes to Glencoe, Glencoe Diary, Child of Glencoe, The Voyages of Frederick Williams, The County Court: 1637-1904, and From the

Archives.


Through the Crosses' enduring guidance and dedication, the NCHSC has developed a significant local history and genealogy collection over the years.



Fifty-nine years later, our historical society's mission remains the same -- to collect, preserve, and share the history of the City of Chesapeake and the surrounding area for future generations.

Little Cemetery Plots in Unusual Spot

Our board members and volunteers have been busy, for years, searching for, and documenting small family cemeteries scattered throughout the City of Chesapeake. However, last month, I came across a very unusual cemetery at Fort Monroe in Hampton, Virginia. On top of the grassy ramparts overlooking the Chesapeake Bay, I discovered over 200 hundred small pet graves.

The pet cemetery appeared to have been started in the 1930s by service members who were stationed there to remember their faithful family members.

The little burial markers of dogs, cats, birds, rabbits and other animals were all scattered around the ramparts. Their military owners wanted to make sure their names would be recorded in perpetuity, as well as their noble pedigrees.

I found Dachshunds, German Shepherds, Boxers, Retrievers and regular old mutts. As I walked along the ramparts, I was captivated by the unusual names of some of these pets. I saw Rex, Tobo, Frisky, Buster and Toodles. My favorite was, "Flea Bag our Noble Friend," who passed away on August 2, 1975. As I looked upon these stones, a warm feeling came over me as I knew Fleabag and his many friends had been well loved and now were resting in peace on the grassy ramparts of old Fort Monroe in Hampton, Virginia.

portrayed Robert Clemmitt, a cobbler from Norfolk, buried in Cedar Grove around 1885. Along the carriage paths we ran into the ghost of Reverend Thomas Davis, former minister of Saint Paul's Episcopal Church from 1773 to 1776, portrayed by Tim Platek.

This was an hour and a half tour that you will not regret taking. You get a little exercise and a lot of history. Robert will be giving the tour again in November. I would highly recommend taking it.



Mr. Gary Szymanski to Present "A Remarkable Immigrant Story" at December Meeting

Join us at Chesapeake Central Library on December 4th at 2 pm for our membership meeting. Our guest speaker will be Gary Szymanski from the Sunray community of Bowers Hill in Chesapeake. A graduate of Western Branch High School and Old Dominion University, Mr. Szymanski has always been involved in civic and community service. He is an advocate for historic preservation in Chesapeake and has authored the book *The History of Sunray Colony*. His latest book, Liberty Meat Market 12th Street Market, From Berkley to Bowers Hill, A Remarkable Immigrant Story is an up-close look at the relationship between the mostly Polish agrarian settlement of Sunray and the business community in Norfolk. It is a story about human perseverance, hard work and determination.





Mr. Szymanski is currently working on two new books: The Historic Sunray Schoolhouse, and Bowers Hill, Crossroads of Conflict and Courage.
