Wallace Room to Display Recently Donated Antique Valentine Collection

From February 12 to March 10, the Wallace Memorial History Room will have a small exhibit of early 1900s Valentines. Last year we were gifted an old wooden box full of Valentines that had belonged to a little girl who lived in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The young girl's name was Laverne Miller, the only child of Walter and Hildegard Miller.

Laverne was born on July 14, 1915 and died of Diphtheria on May 5, 1924. Her mother had saved everything of Laverne's, and somehow this box ended up in an antique auction about 40 years ago. The box was purchased by Mrs. Sandra Wright Justiss of Moyock, NC, who has now gifted the lovely box of Valentines to the Wallace Room in tribute to a little girl named Laverne.

Sunset Lake Park



We have had different patrons come to the Wallace Room asking if we know anything about Sunset Lake Amusement Park. I knew nothing of the park since I am a transplant from Pennsylvania, but to local people and volunteer, Jean Spencer who had lived in Deep Creek during the late 50s and 60s, Sunset Park was a name they all knew. Jean told me she was able to sit outside her home and hear the music and entertainment at the park; however, no one knew much about the history, so it was time to do a little research.

In the June 18, 1955 issue of *Norfolk Journal and Guide* newspaper, I found an article that stated the park opened on June 16. It was to be a "modern amusement center with a swimming pool, to be located on the banks of the Dismal Swamp Canal in Deep Creek." In the words of realty agent, Floyd Cooper, the park was designed to give "colored" people in the Tidewater area a "good clean place to come to get away from the city." The 6-acre center was to contain a one-story dance and dining hall with a modern kitchen, an adult swimming pool and a wading pool, plus a midway amusement show and other activities.

In my research, I found ads advertising Sunset Lake Park as the "Perfect Spot for Picnics, and Outings." The park was open every day and every night. Churches, clubs, and organizations were invited to bring their outings to Sunset Lake Park. One ad for July 4, 1956 advertised "Special Attraction, Harness Racing". At the end of July 1957, the Deep Creek area was flooded with people going to Sunset Lake to see Chuck Willis and Roy Gaines and his Orchestra. They

estimated a crowd of 5,000 to 7,500 people in attendance and according to Mr. Cooper, "Despite all that crowd, order was perfect." Ray Charles was coming on August 1, and they wondered how big the crowd would be for him. In 1958 from October 31 to November 8, Sunset Lake hosted the First Annual Hampton Roads Agricultural Fair to include exhibits, awards, car races and more. By May 1959, a Drive-In Theatre was added and on opening night an added attraction was Lloyd Price and his Orchestra for \$.99 a ticket. In August 1959 Sunset Lake was 5 years old and had a big celebration planned. Entertainment during the week would include Bill Doggett and his recording orchestra, as well as The Platters, Jimmy Bond and The Stereos,

The Gibraltars and The Cameos. Justine "Baby" Washington with Chuck Berry concluded the festivities. The list of entertainers goes on. In August 1960, entertainment included Bullmoose Jackson, Jimmie Reed, The 5 Satins, The Isley Brothers, Larry Williams, and A. Neville.

I can see why Jean Spencer only had to sit outside her house to be entertained. Sunset Lake Park was a place to make many memories. If you have any information, memorabilia, or photos of Sunset Lake, please consider sharing them with our Wallace History Room.

Want to "do" your family history this year? Get started--or get back in the groove--with one of these classes or events.



Journalist and Author Ken Woodley, Our Guest Speaker for February Membership Meeting



In partnership with the Chesapeake Central Library, we welcome journalist Ken Woodley, former editor of *The Farmville Herald*. Mr. Woodley will discuss his book, *The Road to Healing*, recounting his successful fight to achieve reparation on behalf of African American children denied an education in Prince Edward County, Virginia. Led by the editorials of *The Farmville Herald*, the school system chose "to lock classrooms rather than integrate them." From 1959 to 1964, white children attended private academies, but the school system made no such accommodations for African American children. Mr. Woodley's book centers on his 18-month effort to establish reparation, finally realized in 2004 in the form of state-funded scholarships for African American students.

Join us at the Chesapeake Central Library on February 16th at 2:00 p.m. to hear Mr. Woodley's story. Mr. Woodley will have books on hand for sale. Light refreshments will be served. Come and support the NCHSC with your presence and bring a friend!
