



Jim was a uniquely talented person and a caring individual who loved history, especially Norfolk County history. His wife Pebbles was at his side when he passed.

I met Jim at my first NCHSC board meeting in September of 2014. Helen Spruill was president at the time and had introduced me as the new archivist/historian for the Wallace History

Volunteer Spotlight - Rachel Fiery

The NCHSC, and the Wallace Room volunteers in particular, want to take the opportunity to thank Rachel Fiery for her assistance over the last year. As an intern at the Central Library, Rachel cataloged a huge backlog of books that, until now, had not all been available to the public. Her efforts have resulted in making these new resources available for researchers and in improving the information about our collection items in the library's catalog system.

Rachel Fiery was born and raised in Chesapeake, Virginia. She graduated from Hickory High School in 2011 and from Christopher Newport University in 2016 with a BA in

English and a minor in Childhood Studies, and this past December from the University of South Carolina with her Master of Library and Information Science. In her free time, she enjoys gardening, yoga and, of course, reading.

When she began her internship with the NCHSC, there were shelves upon shelves of books that needed to be added to the library's catalog system. Since August 2020 she has spent most of her time copy cataloging, which is the process of editing pre-existing bibliographic records and adding them into the library's catalog. She has also had the opportunity to create original records for some of the more obscure items. Once the new books were added to the catalog, she would then create their spine labels, place security tags on the books, and cover the dust jackets with a protective plastic cover. In addition to adding new

books to the collection's records she has adjusted the labels for many of the multi-volume works and restored several series that had been accidentally deleted from the catalog.

During her time in the history room, she also learned about local history, such as the story of the Witch of Pungo and more details about the Battle of Great Bridge. Although she has now accepted a full-time position as a Library Media Assistant at Princess Anne High School, she looks forward to continuing to update the history room's catalog, perhaps during the summer when school is not in session.

We wish Rachel much success at Princess Anne High School and look forward to working with her in the Wallace Room in the near future.

Archeologist is Guest Speaker at May Membership ZOOM Meeting

Please join us for another ZOOM membership meeting at 2:00 PM on May 16, 2021. Our guest speaker will be archaeologist Mr. Thane Harpole, who will give a presentation on exciting archeological discoveries at the Basilica of St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception in Norfolk. Known locally as St. Mary's, the basilica is the oldest Roman Catholic Church in the Diocese of Richmond, which covers most of the state of Virginia. The parish began

in 1791 as Saint Patrick's Church which burned in 1858. St. Mary's was rebuilt on this site in 1857-1858. During recent restoration of the church, Mr. Harpole's archeology team was called when a discovery was made of a series of crypts and tunnels beneath the church floor.

Thane Harpole received a bachelor's degree in Anthropology and History from the College of William & Mary in 1996. He completed graduate coursework for a master's degree in Historical Archaeology at the University of Massachusetts, Boston in May 2001. Mr. Harpole has conducted extensive research on the history and archaeology of Gloucester County during the past nine years. He has also worked as an archaeologist at the William & Mary Center for Archaeological Research and George Washington's Mount Vernon. His experience includes extensive training in field and laboratory methods and in supervising volunteers and students.

Since November 2000, Mr. Harpole has been Co-Director of the Fairfield Foundation in Gloucester County, and in 2003 he became co-owner of DATA Investigations LLC, a cultural resource management company, also in Gloucester County.


