Battle of Great Bridge Diorama Donated to the Wallace Room

Cemetery Mystery Solved

On Friday November 3, 2021, I went in search of cemeteries in Chesapeake with friends Kay Ziegler and Patty and Jim Hamilton. We were doing research for the NCHSC Cemetery Committee.

Patty spotted two stones in a soybean field off of Centerville Turnpike, not visible from street. They were for two Silvester children, William, who died in 1793 and his sister, Dorcas, who died in 1800. They were children of David and Frances Bartee Silvester. I could not help but wonder, what happened to their parents as there were no other stones to be found?

Cemetery Mystery Solved, Continued

The search led me to a journal in the Library of Congress for John Owen on his removal from Virginia to Alabama in 1818. John married Ann Keeling Silvester, daughter of David and Frances. In his journal he recorded the birth and death dates for David Silvester. David died in March 1797, the same month that his wife Frances gave birth to Ann. Frances remarried in 1801 to Joseph Nimmo who died in 1816 and is buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Norfolk. Widow Frances traveled to Tuscaloosa Alabama in an oxcart with her daughter, son-in-law, their two small children and three or four slaves. The trip took nine weeks and the journal spoke of the hardships of the journey including their encounter with Cherokees.

Using the information in John's journal and David's will that was put to record on July 17, 1797, I felt confident enough to also record David Silvester in the Silvester Cemetery located in the field beside 911 Centerville Turnpike.

Scrapbooks on Display

What is a scrapbook? They come in many shapes and sizes. They are keepsakes of bygone days. Scrapbooks are a method of preserving our past, especially memorabilia of family events of long ago. Each scrapbook is a time capsule, full of surprises.

Our scrapbook collection has been relocated to the shelves of the Wallace Room for the use of our patrons. Our oldest scrapbook,

from 1910, contains newspaper clippings of Deep Creek and the Great Dismal Swamp. All are security-coded, and an index is on the shelf to help patrons find what they are looking for.

Another addition to our room is our collection of Genealogical Family Binders. These are family genealogies that have been donated by people who have researched their family histories and now want to share them with others who have a common ancestor. Like the scrapbooks, they are security-coded with an index on the shelf to help locate a specific family binder. As always, volunteers are available to assist you.

Mr. Frederick Taylor to Present "The Mirror Image: Daguerreotypes" at February Meeting

Join us on Sunday, February 20, 2022, for our membership meeting. Mr. Frederick Taylor will give a presentation on the daguerreotype, the first commercially successful

photographic process (1839-1860) in the history of photography. Named after the inventor, Louis Daguerre, each daguerreotype is a unique image on a silvered copper plate.

Mr. Taylor is an attorney and history lover. He serves on the board of directors for several local non-profit organizations, including Preservation of Historic Suffolk and Riddick's Folly House Museum. He is a former President of the Suffolk-Nansemond Historical Society.
